

The staff and children have been full of enthusiasm to take on the learning challenges for the term ahead and I have been very encouraged as I have observed the industrious nature of the different classes. The children all look very smart in their school uniform and I do thank parents for their support in this important discipline.

We have managed to secure additional funding to support various children in school and I have liaised with other headteachers and our school improvement partner this week. He will be visiting the school in June and carrying out some joint observations of teaching and learning.

Class Activities

The *Tiddlers* and *Minnows* have settled back into school really well.

This week they started their new Topic of Knights and Castles. They have looked at the features of a castle and used this Knowledge to draw their own castles. They found that castles built on a hill or surrounded by a moat are better protected from enemies.

The Minnows have also been busy learning to count, recognise and write their numbers over 10.

Super Sentence writers this week are Pippa C and Poppy S.



This week in Science, *Sticklebacks* have been finding out which category animals belong to, e.g. mammals, reptiles, etc. In English, they have been reading "Dolphin Boy" and thinking about adjectives that they can use to describe the dolphin who was stranded on the beach.

The Super Sentence writers are Vanessa S and Madeleine F-R.

Seahorses have been recapping column addition and subtraction and reviewing multiplying 2-digit numbers by 1 digit numbers. They have also worked on their throwing techniques and have learnt how to introduce themselves in French.

Stingrays have been very active in all areas of the curriculum this week and have enjoyed using their outdoor space to help them with their learning. Their new topic is 'Romp in the Rainforest', so the outdoor classroom was the perfect space to listen to the story they are using in English to inspire their writing and even their grammar work! They had a great afternoon working with Mr Pemble on Forest School activities on Tuesday and were all delighted to see Mr Probert for Brass on Wednesday. He was very impressed with what they had remembered, given that they had not seen him for four months.

In Maths they were able to use the field to help consolidate their learning in maths by making practical connections to the place value work they had done earlier in the week on the composition of 1000 and 4-digit numbers.

Mrs Blake and Mrs Churchill have both been impressed with the effort the children are putting in with their handwriting and are pleased to award the following children their pen licences: Matilda D, Macy K and Charlie N.

Sharks have had a super start to the Summer Term and have already had a wonderful week of growing and learning together again!

In English they have been studying the structure of a chapter of their class novel, *The Saga of Erik the Viking*, and are now planning to write their own adventure for Erik. They have been using a range of equipment to develop their understanding of place value in Maths, including a really challenging lesson making their own Decimal Dienes to help them understand what tenths, hundredths and thousandths really mean!

They also loved their first Mental Health PHSE lesson, getting active with Tom and Hayley from Cherwell Activators.
